| <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Daily phonics lessons to continue the systematic teaching of phonics • Teaching of specific reading skills through whole class and individual reading sessions • Regular story times to promote a love of books and give children the opportunity to respond to books, giving their own opinions and linking books to their own experience. • Author of the month displays in each classroom to familiarise children with a wide range of different authors • Use of a range of fiction and non-fiction books throughout the year to support and enrich topics • Guided reading to develop decoding and comprehension skills • Comprehension tasks when children are ready for this • Story swaps with children in other classes e.g. World Book Day and Y6 Reading Buddies • Reading own written work aloud to the rest of the class (Y2) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Children in Year 3 to continue to receive phonics which is progressed from KS1 • To use books to support the teaching of topics and to generate discussion • To discuss the meaning of texts through whole class/group reading • To give opinions/thoughts on stories that they have read during guided and class reading • To be able to identify different text types using their features • Story swaps with children in other classes e.g. World Book Day and Y6 Reading Buddies • Children to be read their class book by their teacher on a regular basis |

| Word Reading | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words Respond speedily with the correct sound to graphemes (letters or groups of letters) for all 40+ phonemes, including, where applicable, alternative sounds for graphemes Read accurately by blending sounds in unfamiliar words containing GPCs that have been taught Read common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word Read words containing taught GPCs and –s, –es, –ing, –ed, –er and –est endings Read other words of more than one syllable that contain taught GPCs Read words with contractions [for example, I'm, I'll, we'll], and understand that the apostrophe represents the omitted letter(s) Read books aloud, accurately, that are consistent with their developing phonic Knowledge and that do not require them to use other strategies to work out words Re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words until automatic decoding has become embedded and reading is fluent Read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially Recognising alternative sounds for graphemes Read accurately words of two or more syllables that contain the same graphemes as above Read words containing common suffixes Read further common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word Read most words quickly and accurately, without overt sounding and blending, when they have been frequently encountered Read aloud books closely matched to their improving phonic knowledge, sounding out unfamiliar words accurately, automatically and without undue hesitation Reread these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Apply their growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes (etymology and morphology) as listed in English Appendix 1, both to read aloud and to understand the meaning of new words they meet Read further exception words, noting the unusual correspondences between spelling and sound, and where these occur in the word | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Apply their growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes (morphology and etymology), as listed in English Appendix 1, both to read aloud and to understand the meaning of new words that they meet |
